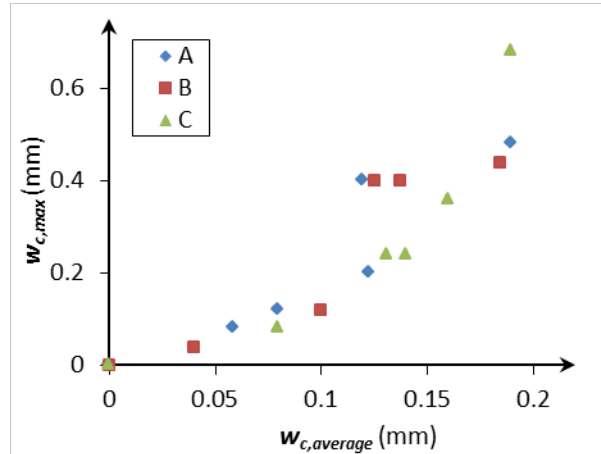


Figure 1. The relationship between the average and maximum crack widths.

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Tables/Figures should be referred with Table/Figure 1, Table/Figure 2 ... and so on. Each table/figure should have a title. For example,

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Equations should be numbered in order in terms of paper not in terms of individual sections. They should be indented by 5 mm (0.2"). For example,

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$$c^2 = a^2 + b^2.$$
